This term has been all about Experience Easter – volunteers have been busy making up packs, setting up, training with us and then helping to run the event. But we've also managed to squeeze in our AGM and – needles at the ready – we are also on the lookout for volunteer knitters!

Experience Easter - It's been a delight to be back at Trinity Church this month with local school children as they take part in Experience Easter. This year, not only were we back in Church, but Experience Easter had an exciting redesign.

After offering our online Experience Easter for the last two years using videos created by volunteers, we felt it was time to return to live workshops in Trinity Church, but with a new look.





This year, rather than moving through the workshops in small groups, each class stayed together and followed through the workshops in order. This meant that we could leave more of the church looking as it usually would, which was hopefully less disruptive for the congregation and enabled children and teachers to really appreciate the beauty and perhaps some of the symbolism of Trinity Church.

As always, Experience Easter only happens thanks to your amazing

support. This year, more than 30 volunteers have rolled plasticine, threaded beads, put together packs, built tableau, sung songs, led workshops and completed many other tasks

to help deliver Experience Easter to around 450 children from eight local schools.

That's in addition to the 20 or so volunteers who contributed videos to the online version of Experience Easter which we have continued to offer this year, and which is particularly popular with the schools further away in the Abingdon Partnership.

We received record bookings for Experience Easter this year and we'll be pulling together event photos and feedback over the next weeks, but meanwhile a huge thank you to all the many volunteers and Trinity Church for continuing to support this amazing project.

Trustees welcomed volunteers, church representatives, and supporters as we launched our 2021 - 2022 Annual Report, and shared news and project updates. Thinking Books: Could you spare an afternoon per week to work with children to improve their understanding of others' emotions? Thinking Books is TrinityLearning's mentoring programme. Volunteers share a carefully chosen book with a child or small group of children over 10 sessions. The focus is on discussing characters' feelings to help children think about the feelings of others and develop empathy. There are notes to accompany each of the books and volunteers receive initial training and regular follow up sessions. We are now recruiting for Thinking Books Volunteers to start in September 2023.
